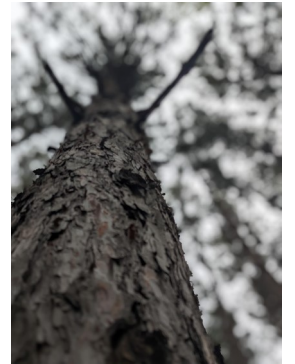

### Notes from Rev. Torri Vande Zande

#### TREES!

*Psalm 1: 1-3*

*“Happy are those who do not follow the advice of the wicked or take the path that sinners tread, or sit at the seat of scoffers; but their delight is in the law of the Lord and in the law they meditate day and night. They are like trees planted by streams of water, which yield their fruit in its season, and their leaves do not wither. In all that they do, they prosper.”*



One of my favorite things about the Northwoods are the trees. They are tall and majestic... strong and sturdy. They are home to numerous creatures, and they hold the shoreline stable for many of the lakes in the area.

As fall approaches, many of us watch the trees change. Some trees have their leaves change color and slowly fall to the ground. Some pines change from green to bright golden brown while others continue to shed their pine cones and damage the blade of my mower. With all the variations of trees, they have a few things in common:

1. They have roots that dig into the ground to extract water and nutrients to grow.

2. They rely on the sun for photosynthesis.
3. They are alive.

Within the Old Testament, the authors have trees clapping their hands (Isaiah 55:12), shouting for joy (1 Chronicles 16:33), and even arguing (Judges 9:7-15). In Psalm 1, the first several verses give a metaphor of what a happy person does and does not look like. They do not follow bad advice and listen to people with bad intentions. They do not spend time with people who mock or are negative toward others. But, Psalm 1 says, "they delight in the law of the Lord and they meditate on it day and night."



Now, the "law of the Lord" in this context is the Old Testament law, but for those living in that day and culture, the law was the center of life. It was the heartbeat of their faith, the guide for their lifestyle. And when one meditates on it, there is strength, stability, fruitfulness, and prosperity. Like a tree planted by a stream of water and produces fruit. It is healthy and gives life to everything around it.

For us today, Jesus' life is our example. Christ is the center of the Christian life. Christ is the heartbeat of our faith and guide for us as we live our lives. And when we meditate on the stories we hear and read of His life, death and resurrection, we come to know God on a deeper level. We are like trees planted by a lake, producing fruit, giving stability to the shoreline, giving a resting place for animals, and shade for the weary traveler. Like trees, we are meant to grow, produce fruit, and serve.

As the trees begin their changes this fall, let us take some time and stand in the woods to meditate on our Creator's incredible creation and our God's amazing love and grace for us.

# COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

## SEPTEMBER 15, 2022

PRESENT: Marilyn McKnight, Steve Erickson, Pastor Torri, Caryl Allan, Mary Parrish, Don Hoppe, Heidi Hoppe, Stan Kumpula, Mike Schmitt, Sue Kimmel, Karen Holle, Mike Bohanon, Cindy Gulbrandson

Marilyn called the meeting to order. Pastor Torri offered a convening prayer.

The minutes were approved as written. Don/Stan. The agenda was approved.

Pastor's Monthly Report: Pastor Torri reviewed her monthly report emphasizing two funeral services that she will be performing in the next couple of weeks. She also mentioned a baptism ceremony for two children that she performed recently and a confirmation that is coming up September 25. Torri will be on vacation October 2-8 and will be having foot surgery on October 5. We will need to help her out after her surgery with walks for Koda, meals for Torri, etc. She will not be walking for two weeks.

Financial Stewardship Board: Don reported that August was a good month for church income. Giving income was \$11,691 which was a little more than last year. Other income from building use, the Trivia Night, and other donations brought in an additional \$8,286. As stated at the Semi-Annual Meeting, our giving continues to be lower than our expenses, and Don is encouraging us to get our 2023 pledges in as soon as possible. We also need people to complete their pledges for the current year. As of September 11 we have received 27 pledges: 3 new pledging units and 24 previous pledging units. Total pledged at this point is \$68,877 which is a 5% increase for the returning pledging units.

Facilities Board: Warnick's Cleaning Service has given us a bid to clean the top level of the church weekly. The cost would be \$170 per week to clean the Sanctuary, library, office, bathrooms, entryways, and kitchen. This includes dusting and vacuuming, garbage removal, and refill of paper products. The company provides their own cleaning supplies and is insured and bonded. They will provide extra cleaning when needed if they can have two weeks' notice to schedule it. The motion to hire this company to start as soon as possible was made. Heidi/Mary/passed.

Fall Projects Plan: It was suggested that we pick a morning when most of us could be available to work at church on several projects. Some of the projects discussed are: Clean out the pantry in the kitchen. Take a look at the freezer upstairs to see if there are items to throw away. Move food from downstairs kitchen to upstairs kitchen. Clean out and reorganize the spice cabinet. Left-over Treasure Sale items need to go to the dumpster, the dump or the storage room until next year. Clean out the lower level janitor's closet.

Two estimates were presented by Kerry for church projects: From Brothers Curbing, an estimate of \$1,440 to build a curb alongside the driveway on the west side of the church to keep water away from the church as it flows down the hill.

An estimate from Watermain Insulating for insulation of the water line into the church from the street to keep the line from freezing in the winter. This estimate was \$5,530 which was close to the estimate the City had for what appeared to be quite a bit more work. Council agreed that this

project must be done when the City does their part. The cost will be updated as we get closer to the actual work.

Personnel: Marilyn is looking for another person for her team. Her next project will be to re-write Pastor Torri's call letter for the new year.

Ministry Teams: Congregational Life: CL team passed around a copy of the church directory that is being worked on. We will get a few more pictures, make a few more changes, and give it to folks before they leave for the winter.

Worship: Council voted today to remove the "Covid ropes" from the pews inside the Sanctuary which will allow people to sit where they would like to sit. Mary/Don/passed. Two pews will be removed in the Sanctuary to allow for wheelchairs to easily be accommodated.

Youth and Families: Our first Community Meal will be September 28 from 4:30 – 5:30. We will continue the program twice a month until mid December and will then re-evaluate the schedule.

Women's Fellowship: The last meeting of the Women's Fellowship was a wine-tasting and food-pairing extravaganza. The meeting was enjoyed by all. Next month join us for coffee and conversation on October 13.

Men's Fellowship: Stan reported that nine men attended the meeting to watch videos of Hunt Utilities demonstrating energy efficient housing. Next month the men will explore the solar electrical system installed at St. Paul's and will go out for breakfast.

Justice Ministry Team: The Justice Ministry Team will begin a fall book study on Wednesday, Sept. 21 at 7:00 pm. The book chosen for this discussion is Savvy Ally by Jeannie Gainsburg. The book is a guide to becoming a skilled LGBTQ+ advocate.

On Thursday, September 22 beginning at 5:30 all community members are invited to the Leech Lake Culture Alliance 3<sup>rd</sup> Annual Autumn Equinox Unity Day Celebration. The potluck gathering and round dance is at the Onigum Community Center.

On Sunday, September 25, after worship, Vicki Wunsch will be at Union for our forum, Open and Affirming, What's Next?

September 30 at 6:30 the JMT will be showing the documentary KISS THE GROUND for the community.

On October 8, JMT members will be attending a Climate Change Forum at Deep Portage.

Fundraising: Steve reported that the next Trivia Night fundraiser is scheduled for October 22. Steve is also looking into ways to increase our building use fee income in the future. Don reported that in 2022 we have already raised \$2,300 for the church through building use fees.

Tech Team: Mike Schmitt has requested that Council members attend a training September 20 to improve our understanding of computer technology. Council members will learn about their new church emails and will learn to store church documents in a different way electronically.

Meeting adjourned. Next meeting is October 20. Clerk, Karen Holle

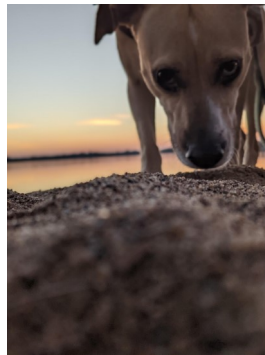
# THROUGH KODA'S EYES

### I Wandered Lonely as a Cloud

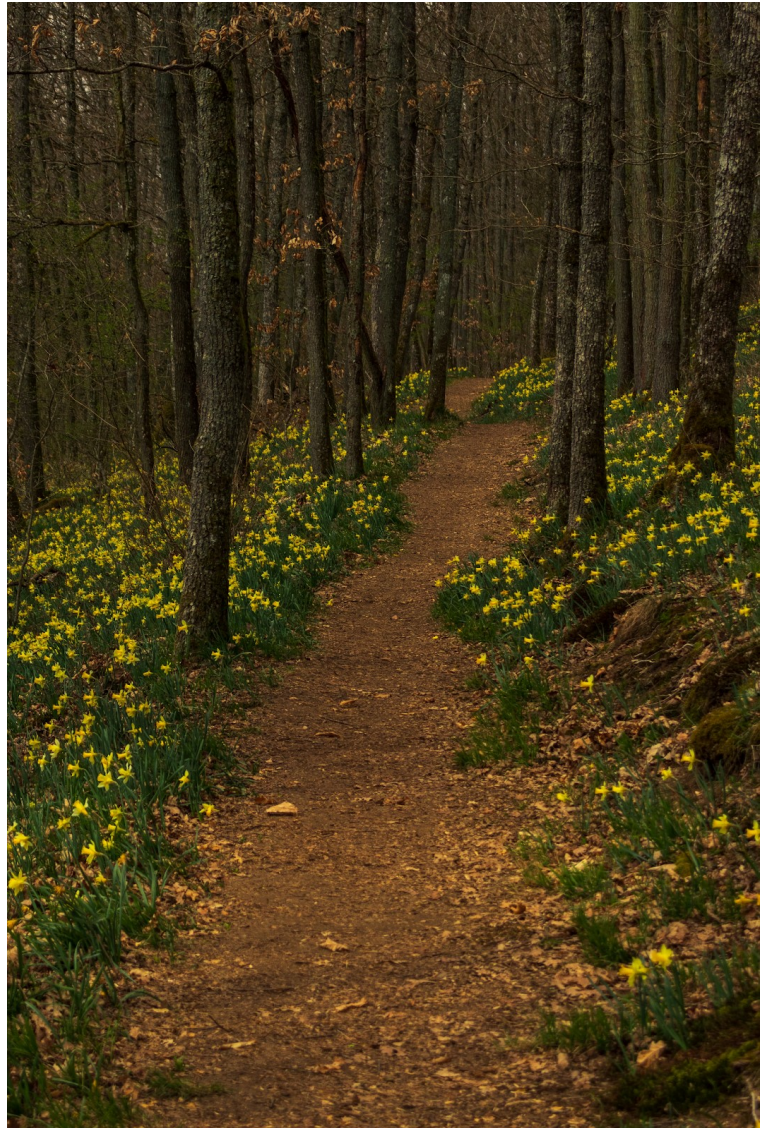
By William Wordsworth

### Summary

August giving was about normal and a little more than 2021, but expenses were lower than normal. There was also more Other Income, especially from building use, Trivia/Silent Auction, and money from donations and unexpected miscellaneous funds.

As stated at the semi-annual meeting, our giving continues to be lower than projected, and we expect that our income in 2022 may not fully meet our expenses.

The new outside door to the lower level has been installed and paid for out of MRI Reserve funds, but not reflected in this report.

For the long-term financial health of Union Church, we need strong giving and completion of pledges in 2022 and strong pledging and giving in 2023. We hope to receive 50 pledges for next year.

As of September 18<sup>th</sup> we have received 30 pledges: 3 new pledging units and 27 previous pledging units. Total pledged at this point is \$ 76,377.00, which includes a 4.8% increase in the pledged amount from the 27 returning pledging units.

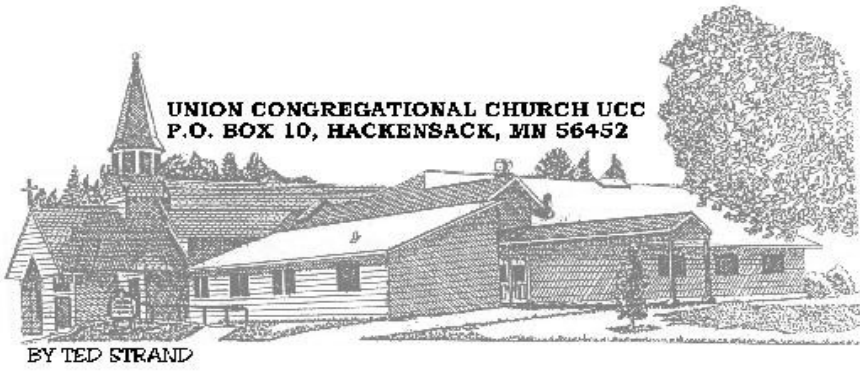
