I have been at Union Congregational for almost 3 years. I have learned many things along the way - however, one of the most important things I have learned is that Minnesota has a lot of bugs!

I was educated when I first moved here about ticks. How to check for ticks, how to remove a tick, what to use to repel ticks, and what to do if you get bitten by a tick. It was quite the education! Then tick season ended and mosquito season started! I hate mosquitos and mosquito spray. I think it stinks. So, I was told to try tea tree oil. Well, the tea tree oil smells worse than the spray, so most of the time I just opt for getting bit.

So once the dragonflies hatch and eat all the mosquitos, I am a pretty happy person... until the deer flies come around! Within seconds I have at least one orbiting my head, and if I spend more than ten minutes outside, I will have three to five of them having a party in my hair. So, I have two choices; I can either tape a disposable cup to my hat or put dryer sheets in my pockets and tie one to my baseball hat. I opted for the dryer sheets. It surprisingly works!

So why am I telling you all this?

Life is full of bugs. Just when you think you have one under control, another hatches. There is always something that we need to fix or need to adapt to. Bugs in life take many forms. Some bugs look like a car that needs to be fixed, a pet who can't stop chewing on our shoes, or a skin condition we can't find the right medication for. Bugs are everyday annoyances that take up time and energy out of our day and distract us from what really needs to have our attention.

In Philippians 4:8-9, Paul tells his friends:

⁹Finally, beloved, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things. ¹⁰Keep on doing the things that you have learned and received and heard and seen in me, and the God of peace will be with you.

So, I need to ask myself, "What do these verses mean to me as I deal with all the bugs in my life?"

These verses remind me that I must look past the annoying bugs and try to find the positive elements in the situation. If I allowed the ticks, mosquitos, and deer flies to rule my life, I would miss out on some beautiful hikes through the woods. I would not be as physically active and be at risk for health issues. 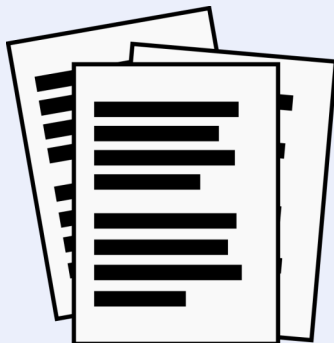

Our congregation’s Justice Ministry Team cordially invites one and all to its second public forum of the summer, *Holding Relationships Sacred*. **August 8th, the second Sunday in August**, is the date. **10:45 A.M.**, following worship, is the time. The session will last about an hour, including time for discussion.

With our focus on encouraging understanding between the local, seasonal, and Native American communities, we have invited Joy Persall, leadership coach and strategic organizational consultant, to be our speaker. Ms. Persall holds an M.A. in Organization Management and Development. As a woman of Ojibwe Metis’ descent, mother, grandmother, gardener, and seed keeper, she is a gardener of people, teams, and organizations. Her consulting addresses the need of organizations and their leadership for support in creating change, managing transitions, and developing leaders in diverse communities. She believes in taking a seed germ of understanding and growing it into something that we would have never known, developing our ability to listen and learn as we create new solutions in a grounded atmosphere of human dignity and respect. Ms. Persall brings a depth and breadth of experience in leading change toward equitable and inclusive systems by believing in our power to look within ourselves, and to listen to all voices with a sense of curiosity. These are all timely themes, both for our congregation and for our wider community.

Union’s Justice Ministry Team cordially invites and encourages all Union Church members and friends, and the public, including both permanent and seasonal residents, to come to this special event on August 8th.

COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES – JULY 15, 2021

PRESENT: Caryl Allan, Don Hoppe, Pastor Torri Vande Zande, Heidi Hoppe, Cindy Gulbrandson, Tom Cox, Ron Merritt, Mike Bohanon, Stan Kumpula, Joni Kumpula, Karen Holle, Marilyn and Steve Erickson

Joni Kumpula called the meeting to order. Pastor Torri offered a convening prayer. The agenda was approved as written. Tom/Heidi. Minutes of the last meeting were approved. Heidi/Cindy

Pastor's Monthly Report to Council: Pastor Torri has been doing a lot of community work this month. She has been working hard to make sure people in the community know about the plan to build a dog park in Hackensack and to raise funds for it. She also organized the "pet parade," part of the Sweetheart Day parade that featured 32 dogs and one chicken wearing a sombrero!

There are several new people coming to our services that Torri would like us to reach out to.

Financial Stewardship: Don reported that giving income for the first 6 months of 2021 is \$69,458 which is \$14,374 less than in 2020. This income difference has been covered by a carryover of \$19,537 from last year. For the remainder of 2021 the estimated giving income is about \$58,000, which makes our total giving for 2021 about \$138,000. Our budget for 2021 is \$169,883. Additional income will come from the Treasure Sale, building use fees, and other miscellaneous giving and income. Don is projecting a balanced budget for 2021 but does not expect a carryover for 2022.

Facilities: Ron reported that a total of \$10,700 was spent on our new stove which includes the stove itself and the cost of hooking the stove up. Some of the cost of the stove came from our Bequests and Special Gifts fund, and the rest came from a member of the church. The old stove has been listed on-line for sale.

Woock-Ness Property – Joni would like to continue to be the liaison for the Woock-Ness Property conservation easement. Motion to approve: Heidi/Cindy/passed.

Ministry Team Reports: Outreach: Karen reported that the current mission of the month is Paws + Claws. The large wooden bin in the church entryway has been filled with dog toys and blankets for the organization. Any monies collected this month for the mission will be forwarded to Paw + Claws.

The next two months we will be focusing on Church Stewardship and will not promote an outside mission.

Congregational Life: Now that Joni is finished with her job as Moderator of the church, she will be taking over leadership of Congregational Life. She will call a meeting soon to re-assess who needs contact and who needs visitation.

Worship: Heidi reported that the Bell Choir is practicing and will play August 1. Sarah and Tom Cox will preach this Sunday as Pastor Torri is on vacation. With more people coming to services we need regular greeters and ushers.

Women's Fellowship: There will not be a women's fellowship meeting in August. Instead, on August 1 from 1:00 to 3:00 there will be a housewarming party for Pastor Torri and Koda and Bandit at Torri's house. If you would like to purchase a gift for Torri, there is a list on the bulletin board of items she would like. Men and women are invited to join in the fun and to bless Torri's new home.

Men's Fellowship: Stan reported that Bruce Carlson came to the last meeting and gave a wonderful presentation about the fish life on Ten Mile Lake. Next month the meeting will highlight the Cass County Triad program. On Monday of next week the men will build a fence at Torri's new home for Koda.

Christian Learning: Jo Horak was not present today. Cindy and Heidi were both involved in the Vacation Bible School program and reported that only 9 children attended this year. Those who came had a wonderful time!! There may be a re-design of the program for next year. The national UCC organization requires background checks

for anyone who works with children or vulnerable adults. This will be a focus for us if we continue to have programs for children at our church.

Justice Ministry Team: We hosted a wonderful community forum last Sunday which was attended by about 70 people.

Representatives from the Game Changers and from the Hackensack Lakes Area Community Foundation spoke about the work their groups are doing toward the betterment of Hackensack. Additionally, Bill Kennedy, mayor of Hackensack, spoke about improvements underway for First Street in Hackensack and also about road changes that may come in the next few years.

Coming up on August 8, the forum will feature Joy Persall of the Native American Community. Then on September 12, there will be a forum featuring the Leech Lake Culture Alliance.

In addition, the Justice Ministry Team is promoting attendance at the Leech Lake Culture Alliance 2nd Annual Autumn Equinox Unity Day Celebration and Potluck Evening at the Onigum Community Center on Tuesday, September 21.

Treasure Sale: Cindy reported that people are borrowing the tables that we recently bought for our treasure sale. There is concern that tables may be damaged by being loaned out and really need to be signed out and only loaned to members of the church.

Moderator's moment:: Today is Joni's last Council meeting to chair. Mike Bohanon will be taking over as Moderator at the semi-annual meeting. Today Marilyn and Steve attended the Council meeting as Vice Moderators. They will take over as Moderators in two years.

Joni has been Moderator of our church for many years and told us that, "It has been a joy." Thank you, Joni, for all your hard work for us and for the church!

Old business: Video streaming: Don reported that his team has not met to discuss this yet, but will soon. The quality of our video streaming needs improvement.

Additions to UCC

Plans for a new addition to the church were discussed, plans drawn and redrawn in the mid seventies until it was decided to go ahead and build.

An article from the Walker paper dated 1978, shows a picture of Jesse Green and Rev. Arden Johnson at the groundbreaking ceremony for the new addition. A portion of the article is as follows:

“The church addition which will be roughed in this Fall and completed in Spring, was necessitated by the steadily increasing membership and attendance of recent years which regularly, especially in summer months, exceeded the 222 total Hackensack village population. For the past several years double church services have been held from May to October.

The new addition will nearly triple the main floor sanctuary space of the church. It will increase the pew seating space from 110 to 285. We can easily seat 300 in the new building, whereas our capacity in the old church was severely strained by attending crowds of 150 or more at many individual services.

This addition will include extending the church basement facilities. The three new classrooms will provide privacy and quiet for Sunday School classes and their teachers, who formerly had to meet in one big room. Serving facilities will be greatly enhanced for various fellowship meetings, dinners, and bazaars.”

This is the first addition that was added to the church. Another addition followed later which will be covered in later reports. A motto I read in one of the reports was: “We continue to move forward into the future as a welcoming friendly place to worship. “

We wish them continued success in their future career paths. Candidates for the year 2022 are in a review process and given time to complete forms.

The Christian Learning Programs Under Review

Last spring Council determined the Morning Out Program for young preschoolers had experienced low numbers and voted to close it. We are hoping to find ways to engage youth and families in the life of the church to build a base for our church future. Meanwhile, we all appreciate the support given by various church groups to Youth and Families Programs.



FINANCIAL STEWARDSHIP

Notes from the Board of Financial Stewardship

We are well into the summer months, and the weather has been warm but very dry. As we enter August, we begin our Stewardship Campaign for 2022. The theme is **“The Journey from Gratitude to Generosity.”**

During this time, we ask you to prayerfully consider everything for which you are grateful. Consider seriously what Union Church means to you, and please be as generous as possible as you make a pledge or commitment to support our church.

As for 2021, the giving to Union Church is significantly less than last year at this time. We hope to make our budget, but we need to watch our expenses, and pledges and giving to Union will need to be completed.

I am attaching a portion of the Board of Financial Stewardship report that was included in the Semi-Annual Report for the July congregational meeting. Please read and if you have questions, please do not hesitate to talk to members of the board.

BOARD OF FINANCIAL STEWARDSHIP REPORT

2021 budget:

A. Income:

- Giving income for the first 6 months, including prepaid pledges, is \$69,458, which is \$14,374 less than 2020. This income difference has been covered by a carryover of \$19,537 from last year.
- For the remainder of 2021, the estimated giving income is about \$58,000 (this estimate is very tentative, difficult to estimate), which makes our giving total for the year about \$138,000.
- Our budget for 2021 is \$169,883. Additional income will come from Treasure Sale, building use, and other miscellaneous income and giving.

B. Expenses:

- Expenses for the first 6 months of 2021 were \$78,850.
- We are projecting about normal expenses for the rest of 2021. Budgeted expenses for 2021 are \$169,883

We are anticipating that we will have a balanced budget for 2021, but we will have little carryover for 2022.

Reserve & Non Budget Funds:

In 2020 we used Reserve MRI funds for furnaces and other building costs and repairs, and entered 2021 with zero Reserve MRI funds. Only available Memorial Scholarship funds were used in 2021 for two \$1,000 scholarships.

Conservative investments have increased the dividends for Bequests & Special Gifts and the Memorial Scholarship funds versus the previous CD's. Overall, the Reserve and Non-Budget Funds have had a small increase during the first six months of 2021.

At the Semi-annual Meeting in January 2021, it was decided that Non-Budget funds that were being carried by boards, committees, and ministry teams would be transferred to our general church account. If additional funds above the approved budget are needed, funds would need to be requested and approved by the Board of Financial Stewardship and/or the Church Council.

Financial Board Summary:

We have continued to manage our operating finances by a small margin over the last several years. It is only by our members' and friends' continued support that we continue to have a balanced budget. In 2020 the PPP loan which we received and the generous giving, above pledges, allowed us to enter 2021 with a very good carryover. Our current situation is more concerning. We used that carryover to cover our proposed budget for 2021. We have received new members, but unfortunately, we have lost members to death and moving in the last few years, and this has impacted our finances. We have good funds in our reserve accounts of Bequests and Special Gifts, Memorial Scholarship, and Memorials, but these are long

-term accounts, and the principal cannot be used without congregational approval. In August we will begin our Stewardship Campaign for 2022. We hope everyone will prayerfully consider your giving and pledge to Union Church so that we can continue to be the vital and responsive church in our community. If you have any questions regarding this report, please feel free to talk to any of the Financial Stewardship Board members.

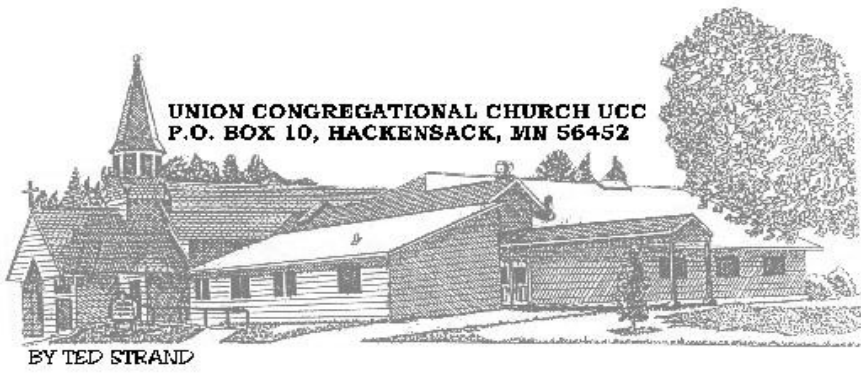

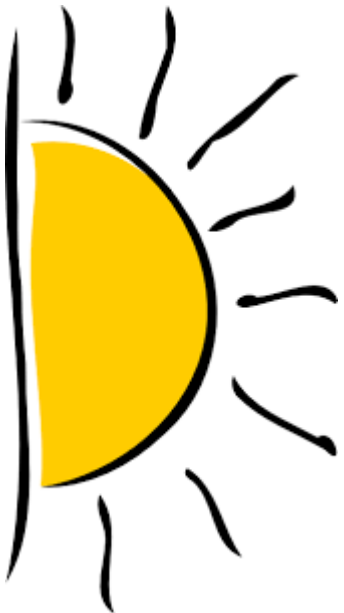
