Notes from Rev. Torri Vande Zande

The Shiny Gold Plates With the Red Velvet Inlay

It happens right around this time every year. We go to our mailbox and see a little letter from Union Congregational. I don't need to open it to know what it is. I know. It is a letter asking for a financial pledge for the next year.



Then the next thing I think about is my own finances and if I can even afford to be as generous as I want to be. I have bills to pay, I have debt to pay back, and I have groceries to shop for. What can I really afford?

If you are like me, I have grown up giving money to the church. That is what I was taught to do. I watched my mom and dad open their top dresser drawer every Sunday morning and put money into a white envelope for the offering plate. I watched my dad tuck it into his shirt pocket or my mom would slide it into her purse. It was just something they routinely did.

Then when we got to church, I would ask if I could put the offering in the plate. They usually handed me the white envelope right before the pastor said, "Will the ushers come forward to receive this morning's offering." I held it tightly as I watched the ushers come closer to our row. Then, when the shiny golden plate with red velvet inlay crossed our row,

I proudly put the white envelope in the plate and then grabbed the sides to pass it on. I remember feeling good about setting a simple white envelope in a shiny gold plate with red velvet inlay.

One Sunday during Sunday School, I was talking to my teacher about how my mom and dad let me put the white offering envelope in the shiny gold plate with the red velvet inlay. My teacher asked me if I knew what an offering was... I didn't. She began to explain, "An offering is something you give to God, but here is the twist. The offering we give, is already God's." I crinkled my nose at her and replied, "Na-ah! That is my mom and dad's money!" To which she replied, "And where did your mom and dad get their money from?" I didn't know. In my defense, I was only 7 years old.

My teacher began to teach the entire class that everything in the creation is God's. God made it, God takes care of it, God owns everything! God even owns the white envelopes put in the offering plates every Sunday. So whatever we have, whatever we "own," whatever we care for is God's.

She went on to say, "God also gives generously to human beings. God gives us the ability to create shelter, grow food, and have jobs so we can take care of ourselves and our families. And what you put in those white envelopes on Sunday, is a thank you to God. It is giving back a portion of what God has so generously given us in the first place."

Then of course, "Jimmy" who was always full of questions raised his hand, "Why does God need money?" To which my wise teacher replied, "Well, God doesn't, but people do. One of the ways God works is through the church. The church is full of people who have gifts and passions to help others who might be in need. The church is also a very important part of the community because the church is one of the major things that molds the community into what it is and what it will become. And the church needs money to function so that they can be the hands and feet of Jesus to others."

In unison, the entire class exclaimed, "OOOHHHHH!!!" But not Jimmy. Jimmy raised his hand again and said, "So how much do the shiny gold plates with the red velvet bottom cost?"

Thirty years later, Jimmy became the new Financial Treasurer of the church.

COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

AUGUST 18, 2022

PRESENT: Cindy Gulbrandson, Sue Kimmel, Mike Bohanon, Stan Kumpula, Pastor Torri, Don Hoppe, Karen Holle, Marilyn McKnight, Steve Erickson, Heidi Hoppe, Kerry Swenson

Marilyn called the meeting to order. Pastor Torri offered a convening prayer.

The minutes were accepted as written. Don/Heidi

Pastor's monthly report to Council: Pastor Torri's report mentions her focus on a new sermon series that will begin on Sunday. It is a six-week series on generosity with each week focusing on a different way we can be generous as Christ's followers.

Pastor Torri reviewed the people that intend to join the church in the next month and the baptisms she has been asked to perform. She also reviewed the personal visits she has been making for various reasons.

Pastor Torri has been very involved in planning the Trivia Night fundraiser scheduled for August 20 in the Friendship Hall.

Board of Financial Stewardship: Don reported that year-to-date total income is \$81,251, and total expenses are \$99,121 to date giving us a YTD balance of \$-17,870. When we add in reserve funds, carryover, prepaid pledges, and unrestricted funds that we can use in 2022, we have a YTD net income of \$13,997.

August and September are Stewardship months. For the long-term financial health of Union Church, we need completion of pledges in 2022 and strong giving in 2023. As of August 23 we have received 18 pledges with the total pledged equaling \$43,877. The Board of Financial Stewardship would love to see 50 pledges for a total of \$120,000!

Facilities Board: Mike and Kerry reported on the curb project meant to keep water during rainstorms from flowing into the church basement. Kerry will be getting an estimate for this work before Labor Day. We also talked about the need to replace two old furnaces that are heating our friendship hall. Gordy from Advantage Heating will redo his estimate for this project. The Council requested that Kerry obtain three estimates for this work before making a commitment to the project.

Karen has spoken to Bill Kennedy about the frozen water lines that have plagued the church for the past few years in the winter. Mike and Kerry will follow up with Bill by asking him to attend a meeting with them to discuss the options for correcting the problem. Last winter the church was closed on several occasions due to having no water.

The new lower level door was apparently keyed to a master key so very few church keys will open it. Facilities will look into fixing that. We also have not received the bill for the new door. Kerry will follow up on that.

Board of Personnel: Marilyn reported on the work this board has been doing in light of Sue Johnson's resignation as our custodian as of the end of August. At this time the job has not been advertised because we are going to have a cleaning company give us a bid for the job. In the meantime, we talked about posting jobs that need doing each week and asking church members to volunteer to do the work. It could be that we will have a combination of a weekly cleaning company and a person we can call on an "as-needed" basis to keep our church clean.

We also discussed who will supervise the cleaning people. No decision on that yet.

Ministry Team Reports: Congregational Life: Ellie Nelson is home and would appreciate visits from members of the congregation.

Worship: Heidi reported that an average of 47 people attended worship each Sunday in July and August. Special music is being planned for our enjoyment and inspiration.

Council voted to keep the yellow ribbons up on pews in the sanctuary to keep people from sitting close to each other.

Youth and Families: Since Sue Johnson is moving out of the area, the Youth and Families Team discussed the Wednesday night meal program. After discussion we decided to offer a community meal once a month in the church beginning September 28. There will be no “door” service at this event, but people can walk into the church to request a take-out meal. A free will offering will be requested. If successful, we will consider offering this twice a month. Mike Bohanon will lead this up with help from Karen, Torri, and others.

Adult Learning: Linnea Dietrich will be coming on as leader of this team in November and will be offering contemplative prayer in a group setting.

Women’s Fellowship: Twenty-one women came to a salad luncheon last month. Next month there is a “ladies only” wine tasting meeting.

Men’s Fellowship: Stan reported that on September 13, the men will visit Hunt Utilities to learn about energy efficient housing. In October the men will see the new solar power array at St. Paul Lutheran Church in Hackensack.

Justice Ministry Team: Activities planned include:

September 14: 5:30 - Potluck and the movie, Neither Wolf nor Dog at church

September 25: 5:30 – 7:30 Leech Lake Culture Alliance potluck and round dance, at Onigum Community Center.

September 25, 10:30 a.m. - Forum with Vicki Wunsch, “Open and Affirming, What’s Next?” at church

September 30: 6:30 p.m. - Movie, Kiss the Ground will be shown in the Friendship Hall. This movie is about how to improve our soil and lower carbon dioxide in the atmosphere.

The Justice Ministry Team zoom meeting will be Sept 1 at 6:30PM.

All are welcome to attend scheduled events of the Justice Ministry Team.

Fundraising: Trivia Night and Silent Auction is scheduled for Saturday August 20.

There will be food available for purchase.

Tech Team: Mike Schmitt wants to build an enclosure for the technical equipment that is used during worship services. More on this project as it develops. Mike has trained Linda and Sabbastian on using Google docs this week.

Moderator’s Moment: Marilyn talked about our need as a Council to address the ongoing financial needs of the church. The issue of income for the church needs to become a top priority for leadership to address.

New Business: There has been a request from Linnea Dietrich to put a sign up on church property to let people know where the dog park and community garden is. Council agreed to that request.

Sue Johnson has requested that she be allowed to use the church for overnight visits she might like to make to Hackensack after she has moved out of the area. Council did not approve that request, but several people at the meeting expressed that they would be happy to host Sue at their own homes when she needs or wants to visit.

Adjournment and Benediction. Next meeting is September 15.



Summary

July giving was about normal and a little more than 2021, but expenses were a little higher than normal. \$10,000 was transferred from non-designated reserve funds as proposed in the 2022 budget approved in January. Another \$6008.24 was moved from MRI to cover building expenses.

As stated at the semi-annual meeting, our giving continues to be lower than projected, and we expect that our income in 2022 will not meet our expenses.

The new outside door to the lower level has been installed, but not yet paid for.

August and September are Stewardship months. We began promoting our 2023 Pledge Campaign with the August newsletter and a congregation mailing. For the long-term financial health of Union Church, we need strong giving and completion of pledges in 2022, and strong pledging and giving in 2023.

As of August 23rd, we have received 18 pledges: 1 new person pledging and 17 previous pledging units. Total pledged at this point is \$43,877 which is a 4% increase in the pledged amount for the 17 returning pledging units. The Board of Financial Stewardship would love to see 50 pledges for a total of \$120,000!

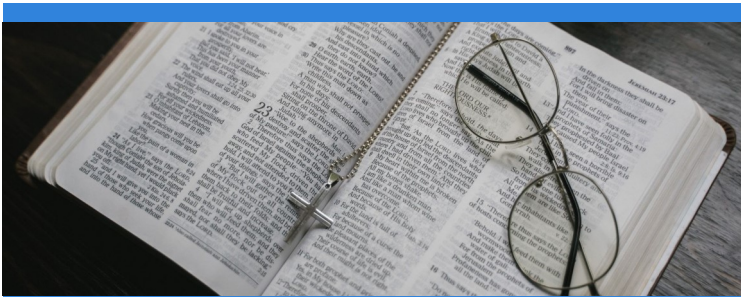

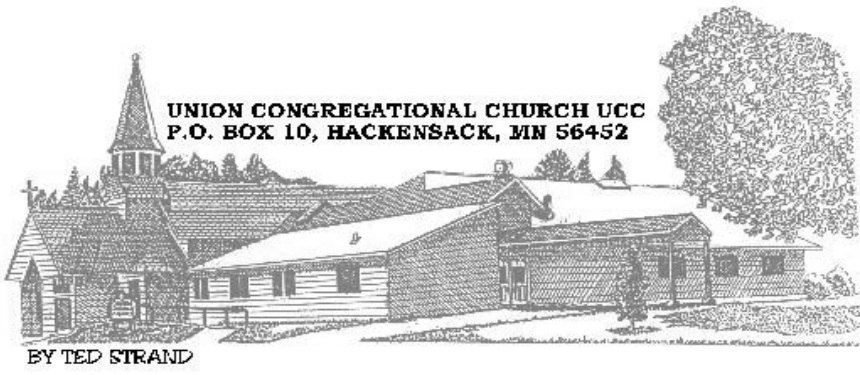
